






Jimmie Allen a.k.a. "The Boxmaster" will be our in-person demonstrator at our November meeting.

NEW NWWT STUDENT TOOL KITS

At our last board meeting, we approved buying a basic tool kit for each of our training lathes. The main purpose is to support beginners in our basic classes. Many do not have any tools, some with the wrong tools, and everyone's tools need sharpening. A key benefit is that all students will be using the same tools, making the classes more efficient, and we save time in the beginning by not having to work on students' tools. The tools are also available at Open Shop for people to try.

Selection Criteria - The decision to buy the kits was easy. What to buy was not so easy. Do we get handles or non-handled tools? Do we buy basic tools with HSS, M2, or M42 steel? Do we make all kits the same or have different vendor tools so members can try different ones? How many tools do we need? After a lengthy discussion, we decided on handled tools, all kits the same, and steel that is cost-effective and will minimize the need to sharpen often in a class. The kits include 5 tools and a great tool wrap from Lee Valley. Mike Meredith, our tool and steel expert picked the following. Craft Supplies supplied the tools with a 10% discount and Lee Valley for the tool wrap.

Handles – Simplifies management of the kits, best for high usage tools, faster than putting a tool in a handle and tightening, and many people prefer the feel of wood. The advantage of non-handled tools is easier sharpening and lower cost. We may add a handle in the future if we need a class-specific tool.

Steel – M2 or above. The goal is to pick a steel that will stay sharp for the longest time. M42 is a bit more expensive but many M2 tools add a process to enhance the steel. CryoTek tools enable M2 steel to stay sharp longer by cryogenically treating the steel for longer edge-holding ability. Time will tell if this is real or marketing hype but so far, we believe it is real.

Vendors – It's not about the vendor but the design of the tools they make. By selecting different vendors, the tools will often differ in some aspects which violates one of the main goals of the kits – the basic classes. We want to simplify the classes by removing one variable – the tools themselves.

Tool Wrap – We looked at buckets and other ways to keep kits together. The Lee Valley tool wrap was the best we found for long-handled turning tools. Most other tool wraps are way too short.



Lee Valley Turning Tool Roll - \$25.99

The heavy polyester fabric (double layered for durability) has pockets for nine tools up to 22" long. Elasticized handle pockets accommodate handles up to 1 5/8" in diameter. Internal flaps cover the blades to prevent damage and fold out of the way for access. Nylon quick-release buckles secure the roll for transport and additional buckles are included for wall mounting.

Measuring 23 1/4" square without the flaps, it folds to 10 1/2" x 23 1/4".



WOODTURNING 201 • PROJECT COURSES KICK-OFF

Following through on last month's newsletter story, we launched our new 201 (intermediate) level "Project Courses" on October 15th and 16th. Saturday's class learned how to make a Viking Bowl.

I saw my first Viking Bowl in a museum in Bayeux, France where a Viking raider ship had been excavated. The shape is fascinating, and the history of Vikings in France is an even better story. For woodturners, the Viking Bowl is a bit more challenging than a typical open-top bowl because the opening is undercut and is smaller than the barrel of the bowl. The modified bead rim is also a common feature and requires finesse and styling for the best look and function.

From what we know from archaeological digs, the bowls were turned on *spring-pole* lathes, common in Europe during medieval times, around 1000 to 1200 A.D. Viking bowls were made in a variety of sizes and shapes, but the ones found in Dublin, Ireland in 2021 (still intact) were shaped as shown in the sketch. Individual eating bowls were typically 4" to 6" in diameter while serving bowls ran larger diameters. The bottoms of individual eating bowls often, but not always, had a foot for gripping in the palm of the hand.



John Beechwood expertly led our class, and Roger Crooks and Dave Wood assisted. Glenn Nord, Eugene Litvin, Ken Puttman, Tammi Connelly, and Lisa Reslock made up the student roster.



Morale was high, the fun factor at full speed, and a couple of our students were so enthused about their bowls that they raced to show them off! Yes, we also had a lot of fun that day.



WOODTURNING 201 • (CONT.)

We finished the day with our usual class picture, but made it quick because we heard that there were hungry Viking raiders feverishly paddling up the Tualatin River from Portland to steal our eating bowls!



Sunday's session on making Lidded Boxes was led by Tom Willing, assisted by Skip Burke and Dave Wood. Glenn Nord came back for more, and Richard Haefele and Jim Bennett rounded out the class. We lost one student at the last minute to Covid, but he's fine now and we'll make sure he's in the next session.



Lidded boxes definitely require a step up in woodturning finesse and skill. Boxes are a form of spindle turning, so this project taught how to cut into the end grain with a spindle gouge and specially shaped "box scrapers". Ideally, a box is made of dried and straight-grained wood. Our wood was still a bit wet, so Tom explained that we would not be able to cut our lids as tight as he likes to do. (Tom is a bit of a perfectionist, so his perfect box gives that close-tolerance vacuum "pop" when you pull off the lid.)

ELECTRIC SPACE HEATER SAFETY • KEVIN JESEQUEL



Eventually, this long summer will end, and we may start to think about heating our shops. Here are some safety tips to consider before using a portable electric space heater:

- Do not use an extension cord or a power strip. Always plug it directly into a wall socket.
- Ensure that the plug is fully inserted in the socket and that the connection is secure.
- Keep the heater at least 3 feet away from combustible materials.
- Keep the heater on a stable surface, not tables, chairs, or benches where it may be knocked over.
- Do not run the cord under carpet, floor mats, or where wood shavings may collect.
- Do not use the heater if the cord feels hot to the touch.
- Clean the heater regularly, multiple times a day, if necessary.
- Do not allow high volumes of dust to accumulate in the air while the heater is in use.
- Do not leave the heater unattended while on for any length of time.
- Do not use a heater that is larger than necessary for the area you are trying to heat.
- Inspect the cord for damage regularly.
- Keep a fire extinguisher in the shop and inspect it regularly for sufficient charge and that it is not expired.
- Do not go to sleep with a space heater running.
- Only use heaters that have been certified by an independent agency (UL listed).
- Check www.saferproducts.gov to see if your heater has been recalled.

This list is by no means complete. Please do your own research before bringing a heat source into your wood shop. As an electrician, I have seen the tremendous stress these appliances put on electrical systems. I have repaired and replaced numerous receptacles due to the heat generated from a loose connection at the plug. I have repaired many wires attached to those receptacles because the heat generated was great enough to melt the insulation off them.

OREGON WOODTURNING SYMPOSIUM



When – March 17-19, 2023

Where – Linn County Expo Center in Albany, Oregon (about 90 minutes south of Portland).

Cost – \$325

The planning for the 2023 Symposium is well underway. This biennial show was canceled in 2021 due to Covid, but it's back again with a fantastic list of demonstrators and vendors.

What is it

The symposium includes five demonstration rooms, a large vendor area, an Instant Gallery, an auction, and a raffle. Each demo room has four demos on Friday and Saturday, and two on Sunday, so you will be able to see all the demonstrators. A dinner Saturday night is catered and will feature a raffle for a lot of great prizes donated by our vendors.

Albany is an easy drive from Portland, and the facility is well-suited for our event. Two hotels are on-site with reasonable rates.

NWWT will sponsor one of the demo rooms which means we are responsible for outfitting the room with a lathe, grinder, audio/video support, and other items needed by the demonstrator. As a result, NWWT will receive a stipend for that support. Each room has ten demo sessions over the 2 ½ days, and for each demonstration, we will need the support of an A/V operator and an assistant.

Why Attend

This is a great opportunity to learn from the best.

There is something for all, from beginners to advanced turners. Beginners will learn how to make the best cuts and advanced turners will see different ways to enhance your work to make it stand out.

You will also see the latest in woodturning equipment, tools, and jigs. Attending the symposium is your chance to be up close and personal with the demonstrators who are very open and easy to talk with. Plus, you will get to see old friends and meet many of the best turners in the area.

What Is Needed

Like our club, the symposium is put on by volunteers, and the symposium is a huge event. Volunteers will receive a symposium t-shirt, and the club will get a stipend depending on how the show finances work out.


For NWWT we need:

- **Tear-Down** – The show ends Sunday at noon at which time we pack up and move our equipment back home.




