2024 AAW Symposium - Portland, May 23 - 26, 2024 · Pacific NW Woodturners Call for Videographers

As some of you already know, Roger Crooks has been hospitalized and is no longer able to take lead on organizing videographers for the 2024 AAW Symposium.

Thus, I, Steve Walgrave, am taking up this challenge, and re-issuing the call for volunteers, as I do not have info from Roger. Please consider being a volunteer for this important task, as we urgently need as many as 25 videographers. Please notify me (swalgrave@comcast.net) if you are interested, as well as apply on the AAW website.

2024 Symposium

The 2024 show will be at the Oregon Convention Center as it was in 2017. There will be 9 demo rooms - 2 Live Demo rooms that go on-air, and 7 standard demo rooms.

Videographers Benefits

- Selected videographers receive free admission to the symposium, banquet, and a t-shirt.
- A total of 24-26 videographers are needed.
- Opportunities to interact with the demonstrators

Technical knowledge - will be part of the interview process.

Videography Volunteers Timeline

- December 15 February 1 Link to the application is on the AAW website or click <u>HERE</u>. (<u>www.woodturner.org/Woodturner/Events/Calls-for-Entries.aspx#:~:text=Call%20for%20Videographers%20and%20Streaming,May%2023%2D26%2C%202024)

- **February** Applicants are called for a short interview.
- **Around the first of April** –Applicants will be notified if they are selected.

Details of the Job

There will be 9 demo rooms including discussion rooms. 2 of the 9 rooms are live.

- 20 demos in the 2 Live rooms 12 videographers.
- The remaining 7 demo rooms with 70 demos will need 12 to 14 videographers.

2 Live Demo Rooms - 4 teams/3 people per team = 12 Videographers

These rooms are broadcast live worldwide.

- **Boom Operator** Operates the boom camera.
- Switcher operator Controls what camera feed goes to air. Minimal technical knowledge required.
- **Audience monitor (Chat)** Monitors audience feedback and answers questions or passes the question to the demonstrator. Knowledge of turning required.

7 Demo Rooms - One Videographer per demo = 12-14 Videographers for 70 demos

Each room just has a boom camera and two large monitors. There will be a room helper who is not a videographer.

• **Boom Operator** – Operates the boom camera. Looking for experienced camera operators. The boom will require training which will occur on the Thursday before the show.

Symposium Show Timeline

- Wednesday Unpacking of equipment and setup of the rooms. Not everyone is required.
- Thursday Mandatory training on the boom cameras and the switcher. Everyone is required to attend.
- Friday Sunday Show
- **Sunday Afternoon** Teardown. The more we have the faster it will go.

NEW TURNERS COMPLETE "BASICS BOOT CAMP" · DAVE WOOD

Several new members got their first good look at lathes, grinders, gouges, and the necessary accessories and gadgets on February 17th and 18th.





Saturday's **Spindle Turning Basics** class included Ron Klug, Jerry Klug, Owen James, Don Jensen, Terry Nefcy, Maria Osornio, and Kevin Reed. They turned "beads-and-coves" sticks first thing in the morning, their first in most cases. We encourage new turners to learn spindle turning techniques first, as the same skills carry through to bowl turning. After all, it's all about learning how to cut side grain and end grain in different positions.







The **A/B/C** rule, **A**nchor the tool/find the **B**evel/**C**ut was demonstrated by Steve Newberry, Lead Instructor for the day. The basics of spindle turning require a lot of body movement and muscle-memory development with simultaneous lifting, rotation, and twisting of tool handles. It takes practice, but the investment in time is worth it, especially considering the reduction in blood pressure and the increase in smile ratio!









NEW TURNERS COMPLETE "BASICS BOOT CAMP" · (CONT'D)





Our goal is for everyone to take something home they make in class. Since spring is just around the corner, and seeds need to go into the ground soon, we thought a "dibble" would be the perfect take-away.







Each student successfully turned a dibble, including burning on the depth marker stripes by cutting a v-groove and holding a piece of copper wire in the groove for friction heat...proof that we don't just make piles of shavings.



NEW TURNERS COMPLETE "BASICS BOOT CAMP" · (CONT'D)

Sunday brought a new crowd for the **Bowl Turning Basics** class, including Ruth Warbington, Chris Erdman, David and Maria Rehbach, Erin McNamara, Maria Hagland, and Terry Nefcy came back for more. Dave Wood and John Beechwood served as Lead Instructors, and Mike Meredith, Jim Schoeffel, and Skip Burke filled the ranks as coaches.





We had plenty of wood for bowl blanks, thanks to the wood-cutting and prepping parties of recent weeks, and each student took a couple extras home to practice. We mounted blanks between centers to begin, explaining the flexibility of this technique for balancing the wood for shape and design features.

On our breaks, we talked about tools and equipment to buy – and not buy. It's tough to digest everything in the first class, but our manuals include a ton of information for later reference. It's also hard to ask questions on day one when "you don't yet know what you don't know". With our dedicated Instructor Corps members, questions are always welcomed – before, during, and after classes. Sharing and Educating is our prime mission.

Some very nice bowls were cut and completed on Sunday. Our wood was a bit wet, so sanding wasn't practical, but scraping worked well. We applied walnut oil and a little friction heat to burnish the surfaces.







Both classes were full with 7 students. We continue to strive for as close to one-on-one student to coach ratio as we can get. We feel strongly that having a coach at your side speeds the learning process by eliminating bad habits before they start. We also avoid some dangerous situations that way.

NEW TURNERS COMPLETE "BASICS BOOT CAMP" · (CONT'D)

Woodturners develop styles of their own as their skills improve. The same has happened with our instructors and coaches. So, if you get a slightly different answer from one coach versus another, try to remember that there are generally many ways to get the same result.

As all of us progress, we need to know more than one way to make a certain cut or scrape because each piece of wood is different, equipment is different, and each project is different.

If you think we must all use the same process for woodturning, ask yourself, "How do left-handed turners do this on a lathe made for right-handed people?" That changes all the rules, but bowls and spindles still get turned!

MARCH WOOD REPORT · MARK McNAMARA



In the ensuing fallout from January's storm, I was braced for a flood of calls and emails about downed trees. Oh, sure, the carnage sent us a few choice trees (I managed to get some cherry and white oak) but in my travels down to Portland and Beaverton, I was struck by just how many of the trees were coniferous.

With all the beautiful hardwood species we have here, I've not been tempted to haul any of that home, but it got me wanting to learn more about the conifers that are worth putting on the lathe.

I've only turned yew which was beautiful but with all the knots, it was hard to know how to attack the thing without constantly turning end grain. I've heard good things about sequoia, some types of cedar and even doug fir.

Enough about firewood! We had a great haul of black walnut come into the club store in February. The tree was located in inner SE Portland and was luckily taken down before the storm in January. This thing was big, and one of the two main trunks was starting to show signs of rot on one side.







The property housed a large old Victorian home that had been made into 12 apartments. All the tenants were really great about leaving the parking open around the home. We were able to get our trucks right up onto the driveway. Everything from spindle blanks to 10-18+" bowl blanks are available now at Dave Wood's shop.





LIFE OF A 100-YEAR-OLD DOUGLAS FIR · ROGER CROOKS

Back in 1986, when we built our house, our trees suffered construction damage due to topsoil erosion. Took three years to bring them back to health, and since then we have an arborist check them out every year. Last fall, all of our trees were healthy and strong. Three months later, Mother Nature had a different idea.

On January 6 the storm's massive winds uprooted a healthy, 100' tall, one hundred-year-old Douglas Fir with a 50" base (*Fig. 1*). It missed our house (*Fig. 2*) by 3', but took out three levels of decks (*Fig. 3*), broke windows and punctured our roof. It also snapped another large Doug Fir (*Fig. 4*) about 15' up its trunk which was incredible.

All in all, we were lucky that it did not hit the house (or my shop!). The moral of this story is life can change overnight. It did for me at the end of December. Today, after almost a month in the hospital and a rough month at home, I can walk again (with a cane), but full recovery will not be until this summer. Thanks for all the nice emails.




